The Sheptytsky Hospital was founded in 1903 on the initiative of Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky as a "People's Hospital" to provide medical care to needy people of all nationalities and religions.

In Soviet times, the hospital was reformed into a city hospital. In 1992, the hospital regained its non-governmental status.



Today, Sheptytsky Hospital is a unique licensed medical institution of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church.

The hospital provides a holistic approach to patients based on the principles of human dignity, compassion and responsibility, and provides outpatient and inpatient treatment, combining medical and mental health care for more than 40,000+ patients annually.



### II. OUR HOSPITAL IN THE CONTEXT OF WAR



In 2022, Ukrainians witnessed a severe war that posed serious challenges to the country's medical system.

Medical institutions, including the Sheptytsky Hospital, played a key role in providing assistance to internally displaced persons, the elderly, and all those affected by the conflict.

Thanks to donor projects and support, the Hospital provided the necessary medical care and support to people in difficult life situations.

# III. OUR PROJECT ACTIVITIES



We completed the renovation of the surgery department and started active work in it.

On May 25, 2022, the Surgery Department was officially opened at the Sheptytsky Hospital, which has an operating room with two halls, a sterilization room, and intensive care units.





This year we received: 3 anesthesia machines, two of which are Drager Julian, a cardiograph and a ventilator.

The Drager Julian anesthesia and breathing apparatus is a mobile station based on the principles of compactness and lightness.






We installed a compressor for the surgical department.

They provide compressed air to various equipment used in surgical interventions.





We created a 24/7 emergency department.






We expanded the Hospital's vehicle fleet to eight ambulances.






The territory of the Hospital was arranged and expanded to accommodate ambulances and install charging stations.





We have successfully implemented the Telemedicine project.

We plan to further develop telemedicine and provide free telemedicine services at the place of residence for internally displaced persons and their families, as well as the elderly who, for one reason or another, are unable to seek medical care from specialists on their own.





We expanded our staff to 165 employees, including 45 internally displaced persons from different regions of Ukraine.





We renovated the third floor of the building and created space for three new doctors' offices.





We installed a powerful generator for uninterrupted operation.





The renovation of the Physical and Rehabilitation Medicine Department has begun.






We installed an oxygen station for the surgical department.





Work has begun to replace the elevator.

A new heating and hot water supply system was installed.





Technical premises and a warehouse for storing medicines were repaired.





We have implemented projects to provide free medical and psychological assistance to war victims and internally displaced persons.





This project had the following components:

1. Provision of free medical and psychological assistance to internally displaced persons at their places of settlement and in a clinic on a full-time basis. In total, about 72,000 services were provided using 7 mobile clinics.





2. Create a medical humanitarian hub to help medical institutions that suffered from a shortage of medicines.





3. Sending 139.7 tons of humanitarian aid to 74 locations.





4. 35 evacuations of adults and children in the combat zone.





5. Organizing and conducting 4 events for IDP mothers.

The mothers had the opportunity to receive humanitarian aid in the form of baby food, diapers, clothes for children and toys. Over 100 mothers were reached during the campaign.



# IV. STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS OF DEVELOPMENT



Opening of the Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy Department At the Sheptytsky Hospital, people will be able to receive all the necessary physical, psychological and spiritual support for a speedy recovery.

We are developing a full program of patient recovery and creating all possible comfortable conditions for this.





Ensuring quality palliative care and a decent standard of living at the end of life.


The main goal of palliative care is to maintain the quality of life in its final stage, to maximize the relief of physical and moral suffering of the patient and his or her loved ones, and to preserve the patient's human dignity at the end of his or her life. So our task is to create decent conditions for patients.





Expanding the Hospital's premises by rebuilding and renovating the roof.

We are now planning to start renovating the 1938 building to meet modern standards and norms, including repairing the facade and, most importantly, repairing the roof. By renovating the existing space, we will be able to expand it for consultative and diagnostic appointments and training of medical staff.





Opening branches and organizing free services for those in need We care about everyone and offer free services for internally displaced persons and their families, children of fallen soldiers.

We plan to open branches in Ternopil and Irpin (de-occupied territory).





Construction of a new palliative care unit for war victims and IDPs.

We have a building that needs to be reconstructed in Rudno.

As of today, we have all the necessary calculations and contractors who are ready to start work if funding is available.
