


SHEPTYTSKY HOSPITAL. REPORT OF ACTIVITIES 2023



I. ABOUT US



The Sheptytsky Hospital was founded in 1903 on the initiative of Metropolitan Andrey Sheptytsky as a "People's Hospital" to provide medical care to needy people of all nationalities and religions.

In Soviet times, the hospital was reformed into a city hospital. In 1992, the hospital regained its non-governmental status.



Today, Sheptytsky Hospital is a unique licensed medical institution of the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church.

This hospital provides a holistic approach to patients based on the principles of human dignity, compassion and responsibility, and provides outpatient and inpatient treatment, combining medical and mental support to more than 40,000+ patients annually.

At the same time, the Hospital operates as a charitable/non-profit organization aimed at providing quality medical services to all segments of the population.

Over the years, the charitable foundation has successfully implemented more than 300 projects and cured tens of thousands of patients, and our partners have become such well-known organizations as:

"The year 2023 was a year of consolidation of the previous year's results for our charitable foundation, i.e. improvement of the work of new departments and branches.

At the same time, our charitable foundation has added another department – physiotherapy and ergotherapy. We launched this area as a response to the growing need to return to full life for war victims. This year, Sheptytsky Hospital expanded the range of medical and psychological assistance to internally displaced persons and became a new place of employment for doctors and nurses from the temporarily occupied territories.

Many municipal medical institutions in the frontline areas received humanitarian aid for the first time. This year, we continued to work to bring victory closer and supported the spirit of resilience of Ukrainian society with our contribution."

II. OUR PROJECT ACTIVITIES



The project is supported by the Archeparchy of the UGCC in Salzburg, Austria. Salzburg (Austria). The amount is 5,000 euros.

In 2023, we managed to conduct 10 free surgeries for internally displaced persons.





The project is supported by GIZ. The amount is 100,000 euros.


The hospital has purchased an additional laparoscopic stand for operations and expects to receive an ultrasound diagnostic device.





The project is supported by Renovabis. The amount is 30,000 euros.

The funds were used to purchase another ultrasound machine.





The project is supported by the WINGS OF HOPE Charitable Foundation. The amount is 400,000 UAH.

More than 600 consultations for IDPs in the Western region were conducted. Taking into account the cooperation with more than 50 IDP shelters, the main focus was on the elderly, low-income people, those who often face difficulties and need support.





The project is supported by Fudocs Freiburg, the Catholic University of Freiburg, and the Ukrainian Catholic University. The amount is 28,000 euros.

The funds were used to support the general needs of the Sheptytsky Hospital and to send six of our somatic medicine and mental health specialists to attend four weekly modules of the course "Basic Psychosocial Care with Trauma"





The project was supported by Caritas Ukraine. The amount is UAH 348,409.86.

The funds received were used to implement the project "Facilitating access to medical equipment for socially vulnerable groups". The initiative provided 2,900 free services for the selection and consultation on the proper use of medical equipment for IDPs and people in need.






The project is supported by Missio Pro Europa. The amount is 20,000 euros.

Renovation works were carried out to open a physiotherapy and occupational therapy department to expand the capacity to provide physical rehabilitation services for palliative care patients and vulnerable groups, including IDPs.

40 patients in need received qualified assistance from our physiotherapists and occupational therapists.





The project is supported by Renovabis. The amount is 200,000 euros and Ouvre Orient. The amount is 17,000 euros.

We opened 2 more locations: Ternopil and Irpin, which significantly increased our capacity to provide qualified medical care in the respective communities and neighboring settlements.





With the support of our partners, we managed to provide more than 3000+ free diagnostic and treatment services to lowincome, internally displaced persons and clergy in the following areas: family medicine, endocrinology, cardiology, gynecology, neurology, gastroenterology, ultrasound diagnostics and laboratory tests, surgery, otolaryngology, dermatology, and many others.





The project is supported by the Ukrainian Educational Platform. The amount is UAH 250,000.

In Irpin, up to 1000 free services were provided within the framework of the project, so about 500 internally displaced persons were able to receive free consultations and diagnostics.





Sending humanitarian aid (medicines).

In 2023, we delivered 61.9 tons to 42 locations.



III. STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS OF DEVELOPMENT



Telemedicine - accessible medicine. The project envisages a format of remote consultation where a doctor examines a patient on the spot and performs diagnostics with portable equipment, all data is transmitted to the specialized doctors at the Sheptytsky Hospital.

Upon request, the doctor provides a consultation using telemedicine equipment.

In this way, our team is ready to provide on-site assistance to ensure barrier-free and accessible medical services.





Creation of a new space for the Physical and Rehabilitation Medicine Department. Active renovation work is underway at the Sheptytsky Hospital to restore the rehabilitation center. In addition, we aim to expand the material and instrumental base for providing outpatient rehabilitation services to eliminate pain during movement, improve mobility, optimal functioning, and increase efficiency and independence.

We develop a full recovery program for patients and create all possible comfortable conditions for this.





Creating a new inclusive space for palliative care patients and their families in Rudne.

The Sheptytsky Hospital aims to alleviate the situation of the medical system in western Ukraine and to accommodate more palliative care patients and their families. To do this, we have worked with the team to develop a plan to create a new inclusive space in Rudne that will be able to accommodate more than 80 palliative care patients and their families. In the past, this building housed a dispensary that received patients from all over Lviv region. As of now, the building is in a state of disrepair and needs to be repaired. The total area of the building is 700 square meters.

Earlier, the Sheptytsky Hospital enlisted the support of the Lviv City Council and the Curia of the Lviv Archeparchy of the UGCC to raise the issue of creating an inclusive space there.





Sustainable psychological support for IDPs

The Sheptytsky Hospital is going to launch an initiative in Ternopil aimed at providing psychological relief for internally displaced persons in a new community. This room will become a platform for free psychological counseling, where specialists will help IDPs find support, restore their inner strength, skills to establish warm, close ties, and unite in a new environment. We believe that unity is our strength to overcome difficulties and spread a culture of trust and care, to nurture sustainable psychological resilience in difficult life situations.





Expanding the capacity to provide medical and psychological services

To realize our vision for the Hospital, we consistently implement inclusivity practices, maintain constant communication with target groups to update their needs, and exchange experience with Ukrainian and foreign clinics to continuously develop staff, change and organize space in accordance with client requests and international standards.
